AMERICAN LEGION POST 59 HONOR GUARD The Beginning Until Now

On November 11, 1999, President Bill Clinton signed the Honor Guard Recognition Act authorizing the Secretary of Defense to provide a \$25 stipend to local veteran groups to perform military honors at the funerals of deceased military veterans.

On May 5, 2024, the American Legion Post 59 Honor Guard will celebrate its 22nd year conducting military honors for deceased area veterans, in what is a final tribute of respect to an honorably discharged veteran who served his/her country in the United States Military.

The Post 59 Honor Guard was started in 2002 under the leadership of then Post Commander, Bill Redepenning, and Adjutant, Wayne Christensen. Approximately 35 Legion veterans received the necessary training and certification led by the Wisconsin Department of Veteran Affairs. Following the purchase of rifles and ammunition from the DVA, each Honor Guard member purchased his own Honor Guard dress uniform. Now, when a member passes away, his uniform is donated to the Legion so that incoming members are spared those start-up costs.

Of the 35 who were initially trained, there are now 17 active members. Of the initial 35, there are four remaining from that team—DuWayne Teigen and Bud Erickson, active, and Archie Christensen and Roger Uttermark, inactive. Two members of the Sons of the American Legion are also current members.

The Honor Guard Coordinator has the major responsibility in organizing and assuring things run smoothly. Initially, after the death of a veteran, he coordinates with the Veterans Administration and the Funeral Home Director. Next, he assembles the team which will pay the last tribute of respect to the deceased veteran. The team consists of a chaplain, a captain, five riflemen, a bugler and two flag holders. For the initial several years, the unit also did the flag folding, but now the military handles that responsibility. Vietnam era Navy veteran, Tom Jenny, is the current coordinator. According to Tom, "I consider it an honor to coordinate this group of devoted veterans". His predecessors were Bill Redepenning, Archie Christensen, Nick Bierman, Monte Whitford, Bud Erickson, and Al Vick. The Honor Guard Captain is responsible for the training of new members, conducting the practice drills, calling the commands at the funeral, and making sure that proper military etiquette and procedures are followed. Past captains were Wayne Christensen, Al Phelps, Nick Bierman and Al Vick. Current captains are Bud Erickson, Jim Schiferl, and Mike Currie.

During the first few years, Post 59 was one of the few honor guard units in the area. As a result, the Stoughton Post was called on to conduct the honors for many area deceased veterans. In addition to Stoughton and Madison, the Honor guard traveled from Black Earth to Janesville and from Lake Mills to Mt. Horeb and most communities within that region. In 2005, the team conducted 135 funerals—sometimes 2-3 per day. Now that many local VFW and Legion posts have their own honor Guard units, Post 59 does the honors for approximately 35 funerals per year.

All members are volunteers; the Post now gets a \$50 stipend for each funeral.

AQUAVIT ON MEMORIAL DAY

The tradition of serving Aquavit after the Memorial Day events are completed, dates back to the year 2000. At the time, Bud Erickson was the VFW commander, and Al Phelps was the commander of the American Legion. Bud was also a member of Torske Klubben (aka Codfish Club), an organization of Norwegian descendant males which meets monthly in Madison. Norwegian traditions which are maintained are the serving of codfish and the imbibing of Linie Aquavit (Linya Akavit). At the March meeting in 2000, Al attended as Bud's guest. On the way home, Al remarked that he thought the aquavit tasted pretty good and that I should bring some to the post at the Memorial Day gathering and "run it up the flagpole to see who salutes". I got my half bottle out of the freezer and poured small samples to some brave souls. They saluted. The rest is history.

There are numerous aquavits in Scandinavia, but Linie is unique in that it is the only one which has traveled in sherry casks from Oslo, Norway, across the equator to Australia, and back to Hasle, north of Oslo, where it is bottled. It is often called Eau de Ville (the water of life). It is believed to lengthen life, get rid of bad humor, revitalize the heart, and keep one young.

The key ingredients are potatoes and ample caraway, plus other spices as anise-seed, fennel, dill, coriander, and paradise grain. The recipes are better protected than Norway's gold stocks. Locked down in a fireproof vault lie four hand-written recipe books. Only a small handful of faithful know where the key is.

It is difficult to say when the custom of sending aquavit on sea voyages began. The most plausible theory is that Norwegian sailors of yore discovered the aquavit they had on board became better and better tasting as their voyage under distant skies went on. The old sherry casks were not full, and the aquavit splashed around as the ship rolled over the equatorial waves. The changing climate conditions, together with the steady rolling that the aquavit was subjected to, had beneficial outcomes. At present, the tradition is continued on today's modern ships.

Aquavit is a sipping drink—not a down the hatch snort. Some like to drink it ice cold; others prefer room temperature,

Lest We Forget: Veterans Memorial at Riverside Park

The Stoughton Area Veterans Memorial Park on Highway B is new and impressive, but it is not the city's only veterans' memorial. Two historic memorials, one honoring Stoughton's Civil War veterans, and the other dedicated to all veterans, stand quietly and often forgotten about or unknown in Riverside Park. Together, they are a testament to the city's long-standing commitment to honoring its veterans and are part of Stoughton's history.

Originally erected in 1887 in what is now Riverside Cemetery, the historic Civil War cenotaph bears the ravages of time, but its inscriptions, including "Lest We Forget" and "Died For The Union" remain legible. Dedicated to the 79 Stoughton area soldiers who lost their lives fighting in the Civil War, the cenotaph was moved in 1932 to nearby land now known as Riverside Park.

An article in the May 24, 1932, edition of The Capital Times noted "because of the filling up of the cemetery, the open space near the monument has become so small that the nearby graves are being trampled upon by crowds assembled during Memorial Day exercises. To remedy this, the memorial was moved to a suitable location on the crest of a knoll on a six-acre plot of ground". Although the decision to move the monument was made in 1923, the actual move took place in 1932. Known then as West Side Park, the park's name was changed to Riverside Park in 1967. *Vandalism*

In the fall of 2001, vandals attacked Riverside Cemetery and Park, severely damaging many tombstones as well as the Civil War monument. A glass globe, a symbol of unity and peace, that originally sat atop the cenotaph was irreparably damaged, but the rest of the monument was repaired. Just to the east of the Civil War monument, a second, 14- foot- tall monument was dedicated on Memorial Day, 1968. Honoring all veterans and war dead, it features etching of a spread eagle, a symbol of strength, courage, and freedom. Beneath the eagle, inscriptions read, "Lest We Forget" and "Dedicated to the Men and Women of Stoughton and community who, in the roar of conflict, by their unselfish patriotism have advanced the American ideals of liberty and universal brotherhood of man". Another inscription reads, "Let no ravages of time testify to coming generations that we have forgotten as a people the cost of a free and undivided republic".

The monument's base includes nine medallions representing various veteran groups. *Memorial Day*

From the late 1800's until 2005, Riverside Park was the setting for Stoughton's annual Memorial Day program, which ultimately outgrew the park's capacity to handle the crowds. Early on. attendees either brought their own chairs, stood, or sat on the grass. As crowds grew bigger, seating was provided, thanks to veterans from VFW Post 328 and American Legion Post 59, who hauled bleachers back and forth from the Mandt Park livestock barns.


Historical records show that in 1935, fewer than 100 people attended the Memorial Day ceremony, including the Stoughton High School Band.

By 2005, with crowds continuing to grow and after two consecutive years of weather-related cancellations, the decision was made to permanently move the program to Mandt Park. People continue to be attracted to the program, which honors all military men and women who paid the supreme sacrifice in defense of their country. In 2003, some 600 people attended the Memorial Day event.
