The second annual Vidalia onion fund-raising drive was a definite success and the committee has designated how the profits will be allocated.

First of all, a big thank you to the committee and to all others who helped on this project. The top sales person was Evelyn Kahl who sold 176 bags of onions. Next, from the Auxiliary, was Linda Swangstu, followed by Mary Curran, Lisa Olson, and Kay Voight. Bud Erickson was the top producer from the Legion with 121 bags sold. 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BERNARD (BUTCH) A. ARNOLD

Butch, as he is known to all Stoughtonites was born on July 7, 1924 in Monroe, WI. He attended several rural schools, but had no further education as he was needed to help on the farm. While living on the farm near Cambridge, WI and working at least twelve hours a day, seven days a week and receiving a wage of \$5.00 a month, Butch and his older brother Eddie, decided to enlist in the U.S. Army Air Corps at the age of eighteen. He enlisted on Nov. 1942 at Milwaukee, WI

Butch received his Basic Training at Miami Beach, FL and several other bases for gunnery training, etc. He was sent to Denver, CO where he was trained in gun synchronizing, repair of guns and maintenance turrets and armaments. This training took place at several bases in Texas, Utah, Kansas, and Ft. Myers, FL.

After completing this necessary training, he was sent to San Francisco where he was flown to Hawaii, Christmas Island, the Fiji Islands and eventually to Brisbane, Australia where he was stationed for a short time.

He then went by ship to New Guinea. Here he was a tail gunner on a B-24 bomber in the Southwest Pacific with the U.S. Army Air Corps 22nd Bomb Group.

About the middle of July in 1944, Butch was with the Advanced Echelons who were ordered to OWI, the "Island of Death." The island was taboo and no permanent native inhabitants lived there. The principle duty was to prepare the area for flying and maintenance personnel so they could commence operations as soon as possible. It was described as a solid mass of jungle where every foot had to be cleared. The foliage was so dense, there was no place to deposit the undergrowth after it had been cut. Reports were beginning to filter back about a deadly disease (scrub typhus) that was infecting men clearing brush and had caused some fatalities among personnel.

Things did not look too promising, but by July 26, 1944, their first combat missions were flown from the new base in OWI. There were not any living animals on this island. A tiny mite, so small that it was a barely visible golden dot, caused the wide spread and potentially fatal sickness. It caused fevers as high as 106 and overwhelming listlessness. Nothing was known about the disease and brain damage was feared because of the high temperatures. Complete or partial hair loss was one of the visible results. Most recovered satisfactorily.

In October of 1944, U.S. forces were in the midst of an all-out attack to regain control of the Philippine Islands. Six B-24's of the 408th Squadron were scheduled to participate in group search and destroy missions in the area on October 24th. Take off from OWI Island was scheduled for 2:45 A.M. Night take offs were always more hazardous than daylight operations, particularly in a heavy laden aircraft on a moonless night with no horizon or light on the ground for reference.

Lt. Dwain E. Harry was the pilot of the B-24 and Butch was the tail gunner. The aircraft was loaded with two 2000# and one 500# demolition bombs and normal take off was accomplished on schedule. What occurred next is best described by a following account from Butch who was the tail gunner.

Written by Col. Don Evans: Our take off was normal and I was standing at a waist window watching for the possibility of an engine fire. This was standard procedure. It was very dark and although the climb out seemed normal. A few moments after breaking ground, I noticed the wing lights of the aircraft being reflected in the water below. I knew we were too low and about to crash. I reached for my microphone to warn the pilot, but before I could press the button we hit the water at full throttle. The next thing I knew, I was under the water and pinned to the ceiling of the plane. The plane must have broken in two, for I floated to the surface. There was a lot of gurgling as the plane kept sinking. I swam away as quickly as possible. I couldn't see anything in the darkness and as I was paddling I bumped into a floating object and hung on to it. When we took off on the mission, I was wearing long underwear for it got cool at high altitudes. I also had on my fatigues, leather jacket, and Mae West life preserver. After coming in contact with the floating object, I realized it was an oxygen tank that had broken loose from the plane. I started to take off my clothes, so I could swim better and then realized that one shoe was still with my pants and my underwear was down around my ankles. I ripped off the shoe and clothing and the oxygen tank sank.

I started paddling around again and my right arm began to get numb. I have no idea how long I did this and then I bumped into another oxygen tank to hang on to. Some of the rest of the crew were scattered all over and things got real fuzzy from then on. I was picked up sometime later. I heard someone talking to me and I think he had a small boat but I am not sure.

I remember lying on my back and being put on to a stretcher. The next thing I remember was doctors working on me and the lower part of my body was burning like hell. I later found, it was chemical burns from the octane gasoline. Every part of my body had cuts and gashes but no broken bones. I was taken to the hospital in Hollandia, New Guinea and later spent six months in several other hospitals.

I was one of the lucky ones. The pilot perished in the crash and also the navigator, the bombardier, the assistant engineer, and two aerial gunners. Five of the crew survived the crash, but one lost the use of his left eye and one had to undergo the amputation of his right leg. Butch was in two other crashes but was not injured.

On April 16, 1944 in the South West Pacific area in New Guinea, many Air Force bombers set out the strike targets in Hollandia, but they encountered heavy turbulence and crashed near Gusap Airstrip. This is referred to as *BLACK SUNDAY* as the number of airmen killed or missing in action was 54 and of the aircraft lost or destroyed was 37. Not a single airman or craft was lost through enemy action. All losses were cause by a tropical storm that blocked their return home. It was the greatest weather related loss in the U.S. Air Force history. Butch has a copy of the book with detailed accounts. In Butch's squadron 30 out of 50 men were killed. His highest ranking in three years was Staff Sergeant. "Star Eyes" was the name of the last of Butch's 26 missions.

During his last six months of duty, he served in Texas as a military policeman. They were furnished with various luxuries. It was the best six months of his three-year service.

Butch received many medals including: good conduct, sharp shooter, Purple Heart, distinguished unit citation medal. Butch shot down two Zeros.

"The perils of war were not always from the weapons of the enemy, but frequently from unexpected or freakish actions of men and machines and from the always unpredictable weather. No matter what the source, death was always absolute and the reason made no difference". Quote from Col. Don Evans.

Butch was discharged from the U.S. Air Force on Oct. 31st 1945 from Truax Field in Madison and returned to Stoughton. He was employed at Arnold's Appliance and TV. Later, he started his own business – B&B Electric, Air Conditioning and Heating for about 20 years. Butch retired at the age of 81. He was married to Shirley in 1945 and they have five children: Sharon, Debra, Bonnie, Bruce, and Shane. They have eight grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren and Butch will soon be a great-great grandfather!

Butch is a Life Member of the VFW #328 and has been a member of the American Legion, Post #59 for many years. He is also a member of the Purple Heart in Madisonand is proud to have served his country.
