Veterans Corner

Donald Helmke U.S. Army 1950-1960 By Evelyn Kahl

Donald was born in Milwaukee, WI on March 4, 1929. He was inducted into the U.S. Army at the age of 21 during the Korean Conflict on Dec. 15, 1950. He was sworn in at Milwaukee, WI on that date and was transported immediately in Camp McCoy, WI for Basic Training. On completion of his Basic Training, he continued duty at Camp McCoy for approximately a year as a member of the 431st Engineer Truck Co. His duties consisted of driving and working in the Company Motor Pool as a welder.

In 1952, he was transferred to Camp Carson, CO and after a brief lay over there he continued by train to San Francisco where he boarded a ship for deployment overseas. After two weeks aboard the ship, he and others disembarked on the Island of Okinawa just south of Japan. The two-week journey was rather uneventful until a day or two out from Okinawa the ship encountered a typhoon accompanied by rather rough seas.

On Okinawa he was assigned to the 41st Petroleum Co., which was in charge of a fuel, dump supplying fuel to the U.S. Air Base at Kadena, Okinawa. His major duties with the 41st consisted of welding and maintaining the flow of fuel to the Air Base. His tour of over seas duty was completed there and in Dec. of 1952 another two week ship ride across the Pacific brought the Golden Gate Bridge into view and he knew then that he was back to the States.

After disembarking in San Francisco another train ride brought him again to Camp Carson CO where he was discharged to the inactive Army Reserve on Dec. 12, 1952. After eight years in the Reserves a full Honorable Discharge was received. Another train ride from Camp Carson to Chicago and on to Stoughton brought him home. He stepped off the train in Stoughton at midnight to a cold, crisp and actually pretty night because of all the Christmas lights and colors. A short walk home and his tour of duty in the U.S. Army ended.

After returning home, he returned to work at the Highway Trailer as a welder. Approximately one yr later he decided to move on and enrolled at the Madison Business College where he acquired degrees in Accounting and Business College. After college he acquired a job managing the office for a company by the name of Farm Loan Service. After approximately six yrs there, he went to work for the Stoughton State Bank as a Loan Officer. Over the next thirty-five yrs he continued his education by attending the University of Wisconsin Graduate School of Banking, related workshops and seminars, working himself up the ladder at the Bank eventually becoming President and Chairman of the Board. In the 1990's the Bank became a Wells Fargo Bank and he retired from Wells Fargo as an active employee in 1998. He continued on as a member of the Wells Fargo Advisory Board for approximately five yrs and retired from the Banking Business all together.

Don is a Life Member of the VFW Post 328 in Stoughton, WI and has been a member of the American Legion Post 59 in Stoughton for the last 19 yrs. He is presently serving as the Treasurer for Post 59. He married his wife Doris in 1953 and they have three children (two daughters and one son). They also have two grandchildren. Both at home and abroad. He was pleased to have had the opportunity to serve his country.



Badger Girls State is an experience like no other for the over 700 Wisconsin High School girls as they will be doing things, not out of a textbook, but hands on as they will be learning all facets of government in a mythical state very similar to the State of Wisconsin.

The entire assemblage will become a fifty-first state and will function according to the laws of the state of Wisconsin. Most of each day will be given to the various activities of government. Badger Girls State is not a recreation or sports program. It is a school of government training for which the girls have been selected by their school and local Unit.

Citizens are divided into two political parties, the Federalists and the Nationalists. They develop their own party plat platforms and formulate their own issues. Citizens "learn by doing" as the function on city, county and state levels by electing officials in the manor prescribed by regular election procedures and conducting business on those levels.

The 1937 National Convention organized the Girls State program as a national Americanism activity. The entire program in a non-partisan, non-political attempt to teach and instill in the youth of America a love Of God and country.

Our purpose in sponsoring this Americanism Program is to develop leadership and pride in American citizens, to educate citizens about our system of government, to instill a greater understanding of American traditions and to stimulate a desire to maintain our democratic government processes.

We believe that every citizen completing this program will help to ensure the survival of our republic
