Over time, the face of a soldier has never changed. Beginning in ancient times, using charcoal and pigments, artists rendered their interpretations in paintings of these faces. Sculptors used clay, stone and metal to give us an idea of what it looked like to be there. The equipment changed as time went by. The weapons steadily evolved, but the faces still have a familiar resemblance.

Not every soldier is brave. Every soldier is scared. No matter what your line of duty or what your job was, the fact that you were participating in a war etches itself into who you are. It is something you will carry for the rest of your life.

#### Clothing Room Needs:

- New packages of men's briefs/underwear sizes 32-40
- · New packages of men's tube/crew socks
- New tennis shoes men's sizes 8 ½-12
- New small backpacks (NO duffel bags)
- New or gently used men's adult winter coats
- · New or gently used gloves/winter hats

#### Allen E. Vick

Allen was born in Stoughton, WI on Friday, October 13, 1939. He grew up living on Giles St a block from Stoughton Hospital, where he was born. During his early education he attended the East Side School, Central School, Junior High, and graduated from Stoughton HS in 1957. He then attended Madison Business College where he earned a degree in accounting in 1959.

Like all young men at that time he would have been drafted, so he enlisted in the National Guard. Three days after graduating from college he left on the train for six months active duty with the US Army at Fort Leonard Wood, MO, A day and a half later he arrived at Fort Leonard Wood's reception center for processing and then to Company A, 4th Battalion, 3rd Training Regiment for basic training. After basic Allen was sent to Army Administration School also at Fort Leonard Wood. After completing Administration School he worked in a supply facility until his six months active duty ended in April 1960.On returning home he was in the 232nd Transportation Battalion, 32nd Infantry Division, based in Madison near Truax Field to complete his required reserve duty. where he became a truck driver. Although his MOS was for a clerk the 232nd Trans Bn needed drivers, which was a job he liked much better than being a clerk.



While in college he worked part-time at an insurance company. Shortly before completing Army active duty, his name was called on the PA and told to report to the orderly room. That wasn't always a good thing, although this time it was a phone call from another insurance company that offered him an accounting position at their Madison office based on a recommendation from the company for he worked part-time. He accepted the job and was getting along well until 1961 when the Soviet Union built the Berlin Wall and the entire 32<sup>nd</sup> Division was called to active duty for a year at Fort Lewis, WA. Still a truck driver, he hauled troops and supplies. A memorable experience Allen recalls vividly is driving to Fort Irwin. CA with a jeep loaded on his truck, pulling a trailer, and crossing Mount Shasta in a snow storm. Army trucks weren't good in snow, but with a little luck and some white knuckles he made it to that night's stop at a National Guard Armory in Shasta, CA. In 1962 when the 32<sup>nd</sup> was released from active duty, Allen went back to his civilian job, married his wife, Agnes, and raised three children-

duty, Allen went back to his civilian job, married his wife, Agnes, and raised three children—Marsha, Jon, and Peter. They have seven grand children—Kristin, Megan, Eric, Anna, Sarah, Hannah, and Andrew—who range in age from 12 to 20. In 1974 he changed jobs and spent the next 27 years as an auditor for the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. He retired in January 2002 at age 62.

During his reserve time, Allen attended several two-week summer training camps at Fort McCoy with the 232<sup>nd</sup> Transportation Battalion—still driving a truck! Allen's highest rank was Specialist 4. He earned the Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Medal, Sharpshooter Badge, and Truck Driver's Badge.

He has been a member of Post 59 for 22 years and the Honor Guard four years. Allen enjoys being a member of the American Legion and the Honor Guard and considers it a privilege to have served his country.


